Each year at the National Life Saving Championships, the Royal Life Saving Society – Australia selects a female and a male Life Saver of the Year.

The selection criteria for this prestigious award includes:

- The highest number of gold medals won by an individual
- For outstanding sportsmanship
- Involvement in RLSSA activities
- Performance and swimming times and results
- Any individual records broken

At the 2012, National Life Saving Championships held in Adelaide during January, two (2) Queensland athletes Sam Bell and Alisha Ellwood took out the double, winning both the male and female divisions.

Australian Pool Life Saving

Championships In January 2012, the Queensland VICI Sharks competed in Adelaide at the Australian Pool Life Saving

Championships. RLSSQ held trials in September and a Queensland squad was selected.

In preparation for the Championships the team worked on their towing, carrying, obstacle swimming, line throw, fin ons, tube hook ups, manikin pick ups, relays, CPR, SERC skills and their overall fitness. The sport of pool life saving is very technical and to succeed you must be well prepared so our athletes usually have a number of coaches for example swim coaches, life saving coaches and gym coaches. The team was coached by a number of people - Jeannie Baxter-Reid, David Lush, Sue and John Winch and Sarah Windsor. The team was managed by Ashley Gordon and assistant manager was Lynda Barry. The team performed extremely well placing second behind NSW in the overall team result. There were nine Queensland Team members out of a team of fourteen chosen in their respective Australian Team.

Under 16

Rosie Lennox - 2nd overall Under 16 women and selected in the Under 16 Australian Junior Barras team. Alex Knesl - 3rd overall Under 16 women and selected in the Under 16 Australian Junior Barras team. Jacob Hampson - 4th overall Under 16 men and selected in the Under 16 Australian Junior Barras team. Declan Kay - his best result was second in the 100m tow (1.06.36) which was a great result for his first competition for Queensland.

Under 19

Alisha Ellwood - 1st overall Under 19 women and selected in the Open Australian Barras team. David Elliott - 1st overall Under 19 men and selected in the Under 19 Australian Silver Barras team.

Kurravi Piggot and Rebecca Campbell completed this outstanding Under 19 team. This team won both the Under 19 point score and the Under 19 CPR. Josh Stone competed as an individual in the Under 19 with his best result placing first in the Under 19 rope throw in a time of 10.47seconds.

The highlight was his 25.05 50m freestyle at the start of the life saving medley relay. Alisha Ellwood and Sam Bell preformed outstandingly well and for the second year in a row were rewarded with the Female and Male "Lifesavers of the Meet" trophy.

RLSSQ members who also competed were Jaclyn Baxter, Rob Hendry, Michael Darben, Paul Barry and Shane Baker.

There was an Under 14 competition on the first day. Queensland had six individuals who travelled to Adelaide and competed as part of their school teams. Deanne Elliott (2nd overall in the Under 14 competition) and Dominic Elliott from Southern Cross Catholic College.

Victoria Knesl (3rd overall in the Under 14 competition), Laura Campbell, Christopher Cumberlidge and Jamie Cumberlidge from Sunshine Coast Grammar School.

Queensland also had John and Sue Winch as officials, they were Technical Judge and Recorder respectively. As well as being competitors Jaclyn Baxter, Di Baker, Marie Elliott, John Elliott, Shayne Baker and Paul Barry were also officials.

Sunshine Coast Council (operator) has shown its commitment to be an innovator once again with a 3 phase approach to water conservation at the Noosa Aquatic Centre. As one of the region's major users of water Council has committed nearly \$200,000 towards the self sufficiency of the centre.

"As the requirement to achieve water sustainability grows, we must as an industry not continue to merely use the water once and dump it to waste "said Cr Russell Green Secretary RLSSQ.

Phase 1 - the reuse of backwash water - implemented 20/11/07 & completed by mid December. Previously the NAC disposed of 10,000,000 litres annually of pool water to sewer in order to keep the pools safe for use. This water will be processed through a stand alone treatment plant with up to 95% reintroduced back into the pools.




Phase 2 - the harvesting of rainwater from the roofs into storage tanks. This water will be used for irrigation and the flushing of toilets. Completed early 2008.

Phase 3 - the capture, treatment & use of grey water from the showers & basins - which is programmed to be implemented in 2012 – 13.

These innovations have seen water usage reduce from 20.554 mega litres in 07–08 to 8.108 mega litres in 10–11, a significant

reduction without compromising water quality or clarity, or indeed customer satisfaction.
