2019 MARKS 125 YEARS SINCE ROYAL LIFE SAVING FIRST FORMED IN AUSTRALIA

During 1892 and 1893, following a number of drowning events across NSW, meetings were held amongst a number of NSW swimming clubs to address the issue. It was unanimously decided at a public meeting to form an Australian Branch of the Life Saving Society of Great Britain on 8 February 1894.

In Queensland we are holding a Life Savers Black Tie Ball on Saturday 6 April 2019 to celebrate the anniversary of operations in Australia and to present society honours. Members and interested person are invited to attend and tickets can be purchased from the link on our website home page. Tickets cost \$170 for the event which includes a feasting menu and five hours of drinks.

Australian Pool Life Saving Championships

PRESIDENTS REPORT Mr Les Mole

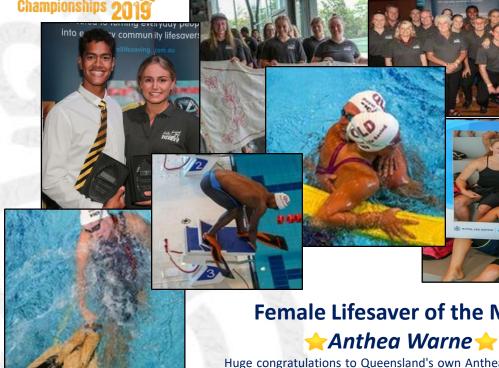
The 2019 Australian Pool Life Saving Championships were held Friday 11th of January to Sunday 13th of January 2019 at Pymble Ladies College in Sydney, New South Wales.

The Championships see lifesavers compete in events including the Manikin Carry, Manikin Tow, Line Throw, Obstacle Swim and the Simulated Emergency Response Competition (SERC) – a timed event where lifesavers are tested on their initiative, judgement, knowledge and skills.

Over 300 athletes and officials attended the event, which saw New South Wales take out the Interstate Overall Championship for the third year running. Queensland had some cracking results with podium finishes across all state level categories, 2nd in the Interstate Overall Championship, 1st pace in both the Open Interstate Championship and Women's Overall Interstate Championship, 2nd in the Under 19 Interstate Championship and 3rd in Under 16 Interstate Championship.

Queensland was represented by Jessica Oates, Jackson Chapman, Joseph Warne, Hamarna Williams, Rosie Lennox, Callum Brennan, Anthea Warne, Steven Coombes, Rory Blair, Lucy McGrath, Sofie McGrath and Summer Short. This event is a child safety aquatic awareness performance which was attended by 788 local school students and live-streamed to additional 75 schools across the state.

Feedback from both students and teachers deemed the event a huge success with student surveys revealing key water safety messages had been received successfully. Congratulations to Joy and those who assisted in the delivery of the performance.

- TRAINING UPDATE-

Update on Oxygen Flow Rate Policy

Royal Life Saving Queensland has reviewed the Australian Resuscitation guidelines, Royal Life Saving Australia Lifeguard 5th edition and a range of other sources in respect to oxygen flow rates for both therapy and resuscitation. There remains some confusion on the correct flow rates, with majority of organisation suggesting 8 litres per minute or 15 litres per minute depending on a number of factors.

As there is some confusion, we thought we would provide some clarity and update our policy for the teaching of Oxygen Resuscitation.

Pulse Oximetry

Royal Life Saving Queensland recommends the use of Pulse Oximetry, in direct relation to Oxygen Therapy, as it may assist in identifying casualties most likely to benefit from oxygen therapy in a first aid settings. If available, oxygen should be administered to casualties with an oxygen saturation of less than 94% (SpO2<94%).

Causalities with an oxygen saturation of 94% or above do not usually need supplemental oxygen unless there are signs of cyanosis (blue colouration of skin), shock, decompression illness or a situation suggesting carbon monoxide poisoning.

Oxygen Therapy

The Royal Life Saving Lifeguarding Manual (5th edition) recommended rate for Oxygen Therapy will remain at 8 litres per min. Oxygen therapy should only be used by personnel trained in its use, and its effects should be monitored whenever possible, by the use of pulse oximetry.



Oxygen Resuscitation

The ANZCOR Guideline 11.6.1 recommends: In patients requiring advanced life support, oxygen should be administered if the oxygen saturation (SpO2) falls below 94% unless contraindications exist. ANZCOR recommends the use of 100% oxygen during adult cardiac arrest.

The guidelines for oxygen resuscitation are based on Pulse Oximetry and not on flow rates. Royal Life Saving Queensland recommends in emergency situation requiring CPR with the use of Oxygen that the flow rate is selected on a case by case basis. The choice of flow rate (either 8 litres per min or 15 litres per min) is dependent on:

- * The patients Oxygen Saturation (SpO2) and other signs/symptoms,
- If the oxygen supply is limited, and
- Time of arrival of emergency services

This means that if the casualty requires oxygen, sufficient oxygen supply is available and oxygen is not limited, oxygen may be delivered at 15 litres per minute.
